
considerations to complete the ornamental garden landscape beyond spring bloom.

Garden Tour – Fitchburg/Oregon Wednesday, May 20, 2009, 5:00 PM-dark

John and Sarah Hasselkus—3001 Bryn Wood Dr, Fitchburg

Ten years ago, this large backyard was covered in buckthorns, honeysuckles, and under growth. Now, a hosta-lined path winds through perennial gardens of shade and sun. The shade garden is under a mature oak canopy and is filled with numerous native plants such as shooting stars, Jacob's ladder, and trillium. The back of the garden is lined with white pines and redbuds. A smaller sun garden at the top of the hill is offset by two silverbell trees. Colorful irises, daffodils, tulips, peonies and columbine add springtime excitement to the garden.

Directions: From Madison, south on Fish Hatchery Rd. Turn right (west) on PD. Just before the top of the hill, turn right on Osmundsen Rd. Turn left on Tree Line Dr. Turn left on Bryn Wood Dr.

From Cherith and Roger's, return to Hwy M, turn right on M, and continue one-quarter mile to a 4-way stop. Turn right on Fish Hatchery Rd. Drive about 4.5 miles. Turn left on PD. Just before the top of the hill, turn right on Osmundsen Rd. Turn left on Tree Line Dr. Turn left on Bryn Wood Dr.

Cherith Bruckner and Roger Fish—1889 Paddock Place, Fitchburg (between Fitchburg

and Oregon) Their shady gardens are woven throughout wonderful hickories, oaks, and walnuts on a corner lot. Like nature itself, the gardens have had little or no pen-to-paper planning. No sharp edges or straight paths will be found here. The gardens have taken shape gradually over the last 12+ years—from their first efforts of pulling wild raspberry brambles and weeds to what has grown into a passion to enhance the woodland setting, but with a desire not to bend the scene beyond its breaking point. A casual discussion on a water feature led to a full-fledged stream, waterfall, and pond. A lot of terra forming played a role in creating a "natural" setting. Over any one of three bridges lie plants and structures and crags and crevices that hold countless surprises and rewards. Vignettes of many shadeloving perennials and shrubs continue to evolve along the woodland paths and water elements.

Directions: From Madison, South on Fish Hatchery Rd. Turn left on Hwy M (east). This is a 4-way stop. Drive one-quarter mile and turn left on Barry Dr (Briarwood neighborhood sign). Turn right on Stable View Lane. Turn left on Paddock Place. From Ed's, return on MM (N Main) to Hwy M (just before 14) and turn left on M. Drive about 2.5 miles. Turn right on Barry Dr (Briarwood neighborhood sign). Turn right on Stable View Lane. Turn left on Paddock Place.

Ed Lyon and Dylan Hart—248 N Main St, Oregon

Ed Lyon and Dylan Hart's small but packed garden starts at the street curb and runs to the back lot line, with no remaining turf. The gardens are predominantly shade with a few sun pockets and surround a 110 year old Victorian home. Plant materials run the gamut of tried and true to the latest cultivars and the design focuses on foliage, texture and form, utilizing perennials, trees and shrubs, annuals and tropicals as well as garden art. Note the use of various cultivars of Hachonechloa that weave through the entire garden and connect front with back as well as contrasting foliage that provides visual interest all season.

Directions: From Cherith and Roger's, return to Hwy M and continue left (east) about 2.5 miles. Turn right on Hwy MM, which becomes N Main St in Oregon. Park in the school parking lot adjoining Ed's house. From Madison, south on Hwy 14. Turn right at the second MM exit, which becomes N Main St. Go through two stoplights. Ed and Dylan's garden is on the left. Park in the school parking lot adjoining the house.

Garden Tours—McFarland Wednesday, June 3, 2009, 5:00 PM-dark

Debbie Wiesman-6205 Johnson St, McFarland

Debbie's garden has been a work in progress for 25 years, with the goal of "not much grass." The front (west) gardens combine decorative fencing with sunshine and shade gardens along the sidewalk. The back yard (east) includes three large gardens, a fire pit area, pool, garden shed, deck, and screened porch. The north side of the house is a shade garden and the south side is a cutting garden for annual flowers.

Directions: Hwy 51 south to McFarland. Turn left on Hwy MN (Farwell Dr). Go to the first 4-way stop. Go through the intersection (Bashford St) and turn right on Johnson St. Go past the school. Debbie is on left, next to the Silo house.

Virginia and Dick Sonn—5207 Marsh Rd, McFarland

The Sonn's had their home built in 2000 on an open farm field. Steve Lesch drew up a landscape design for them from which they have sometimes strayed, "as it's hard to resist new plants." Their garden includes a pond, many sun and shade perennials and a collection of "found object" garden ornaments.

Directions: Hwy 51 south to McFarland. Turn left on Hwy MN (Farwell Dr) and follow it as it becomes Main St (left turn at 4-way stop) and Broadhead St (right turn at 4-way stop). Turn left on Marsh Rd (McFarland Lutheran Church is on that corner). Drive 0.5 miles and the Sonn garden is on the right.

Todd and Wendy Meicher—5510 Glenway St, McFarland

This Japanese garden has been the most requested repeat of all our garden tours. Todd and Wendy Meicher have hosted garden tours of their garden creation called Shakai for twenty years now since the garden's inception. In 1997 their garden was featured in the Capital Times by reporter Linda Brazill. Its inspiration and direction are in essence Japanese but done using hard and soft landscape material indigenous to Wisconsin. Todd's studies in landscape design and horticulture started at Solano Community College in California where he received an associate degree. He then worked with a company that specialized in micro landscape work—installing garden ponds, dry stream beds, and theme gardens. He returned to Wisconsin in 1979 and purchased a home in 1984. The garden began in 1985 and has become a regular stop for curious visitors seeking advice and quiet respite. Many have likened it to entering another place in time. Their goal is to let others realize that it can be done and that it can be fun. The garden itself features three garden ponds, two of which are connected by a beautiful little rill stream that acts as the filtration system. His wife Wendy has been a constant inspiration and brings her own individual artistic talents and skills to the garden.

Directions: Hwy 51 south to McFarland. Turn left on Hwy MN (Farwell Dr) and follow it as it becomes Main St (left turn at 4-way stop) and Broadhead St (right turn at 4-way stop). Turn left on Glenway St (the street after Leanne). Drive 0.1 mile and the Meicher garden is on the left.
