**Directions**: The easiest way to their place is as follows: Illinois Tollway (I-90) to Randall Road. South on Randall Road approx. 9 miles to Bolcum Road. Turn right (heading west) on Bolcum approx. 2 1/2 miles to Denker Road. Turn right on Denker Road. The first road you reach on Denker is Deer Run Drive. Turn left on Deer Run Drive, our house is on the corner of Deer Run Drive and Denker. Gray house on the right side of Deer Run Drive. (To help you find Bolcum, since there isn't a traffic light on the corner of Randall and Bolcum, you will pass Silver Glen Road, which has a trafic light and a shopping center with a Dominick's grocery store and a Chili's restaurant, right before you reach Bolcum. There is a sign for the Christ Community Church on the corner of Bolcum and Randall.

# July Garden Tours

# July 2 - McFarland

### The Garden of Gene and Betty Henry

3472 Orvald Park Drive. McFarland

Situated on 15 acres on the Yahara River, there are perennial gardens, a water garden with 3 waterfalls, and walking paths with views of short and tall grass prairies and woodland habitat specifically planted for birds.

**Directions**: Take Hwy 51 south past McFarland (the stop light at Culver's) about 4 miles. Turn left on County Hwy AB. Go exactly 1 mile and turn left on Orvald Park Dr. (not the sharp left). Home and garden are at the end of the cul de sac.

### The Garden of Todd and Wendy Meicher

5510 Glenway St. McFarland

The garden is an interpretation of a Japanese stroll garden, featuring three ponds, a stream and an island and shows mastery of scale, perception and plant varieties. **Directions**: Take Hwy 51 south to McFarland.(Culver's is on the corner) Go left onto Hwy MN/Farwell St. Continue to the 1st 4-way stop. Turn left onto Hwy MN/Main St. At the next 4-way stop, again turn left onto Hwy MN/Broadhead St. Go about 5 blocks and turn left onto Glenway St. Garden and home on the left at 5510.

#### The Garden of David and Sue Weimer

4519 Lakeview St. McFarland

Twelve-plus beds feature many varieties of lilies, daylilies, hostas, grasses, and other perennials, plus an herb and sedum garden and a water feature.

**Directions**: Take Hwy 51 south towards McFarland. Take the Sigglekow Exit. Turn right onto Sigglekow. Go past the 4-way stop and continue to Earling Ave. Left on Earling. Go three blocks and make a sharp turn on Lakeview. Home and garden are on the corner on the left.

# July 23 - Verona/Mt. Horeb

#### Garden of Jeannette Golden

4142 County Road F, Mt. Horeb

The Golden farm has, over the past 8 years, had the quest to fill an acre with gardens. Each spring one or more of the beds have been added. (This spring— 3 new shade beds.) Jeanette uses a combination of native and exotic plants in an ecclectic, naturalistic and personal design. There are sun and shade gardens, a farm pond, a rock garden, vegetable garden, a bold and tropicalesque garden, and last year's new garden, which was inspired by the writings of Piet Oudolf and is filled with plants he recommends. The borrowed landscape includes a cattailmarsh and the beautiful hills of the driftless area in Vermont Township.

**Directions**: Take Hwy. 18 West to Mount Horeb Business 18-151 exit. Follow Business 18-151 to the first stop light where you turn Right onto Hwy 78 North. Go 1.9 miles on 78 to County Road J, and turn Left onto J. Follow J to first stop sign and turn left to remain on J. Continue on J to the next stop sign, where it dead-ends into F. Turn Right on F. It is the first barn on the right, 0.2 miles down F. They are at the corner of F and Blue Mounds Trail. You can park up and down the driveway. If that is full, it is best to park on Blue Mounds Trail.

**Directions from Golden farm to Finner's**: Turn left out of Golden's driveway onto F. Go .2 miles, turn left on J. Follow signs for J until you hit stop sign at Hwy 78. Turn right onto 78. At first stop light in Mt. Horeb, turn Left onto Business 18-151. Follow Bus. 18-151 to the Hwy. 18 East entrance. Follow 18 East to the exit for J. Take J south to Finner's.

### Garden of Sandy and Marsh Finner

2085 County Road J, Verona

Hilltop Hideaway. This private paradise was designed for a couple who enjoy gardening. A barren construction site was transformed into a series of garden environments, including a prairie garden, a shade garden, a vegetable garden and water garden. This oasis includes a stream-fed pond and a dramatic waterfall from the upper deck. A romantic belvedere overlooks this magical kingdom and offers a distant view of the surrounding country side.

**Directions**: Travel west of Verona on US Hwy 18-151 about 5 miles to County Road J. Travel south on J about 1.5 miles. (This is about 1/2 mile north of the intersection of County Roads J and G..) Garden is on west side of J at upper end of a long, wooded driveway.

**Directions**: Take University Bay Drive and turn north on Lake Mendota Drive. Turn left into Eagle Heights. There is parking on left side of road or in the lot to the left. You then walk across Lake Mendota Drive to the gardens.

# A Garden Through the Seasons continued

We are now halfway through our opportunity to see the progression of a garden from spring through fall. Fellow WHPS member Tom Cottington has a very lovely garden in Middleton and has invited us to visit on four separate dates this year. # Well, Did You Know? Relatives of Our Wildflowers

Gene Bush, lecturer, photographer, artist, and plantsman, owns Munchkin Nursery, a retail and mail order nursery specializing in woodland and dwarf wildflowers. He says, "There is an abundance of native plants to use in the shade or woodland garden. When you have grown the local species, what next? There are, in many cases, additional species around the world related to our locals. For example, we have two species of Jack in the Pulpit found in our native wood. # Plant Exploration and Introduction

How does one find new species and introduce them to the public? Panayoti Kelaidis supervises the curatorial staff and helps direct the Denver Botanic Garden horticulture team on inventory, maintenance, interpretation and integrity for over 15,000 kinds of living plants. His far-reaching knowledge of horticulture has aided him in overseeing Plant Select®, a unique program that aides in plant introduction (www.plantselect.org). As a plant explorer, Panayoti has traveled the world over in search of new species and has spent extensive time in the mountains of Mexico, South America, Europe, South Africa and China. He will take us through the process of exploration and introduction.

# What to do with Those Plants Resulting from "Explorations"

Gwen, who has been editor of the *Rock Garden Quarterly*, owns two gardens with Panayoti in Denver. Their gardens have been featured in many articles, including *Sunset* and the *New York Times*. As gardeners they make a perfect team, with Gwen adding the design elements while Panayoti experiments with species from around the world. Of Panayoti's explorations, Gwen says, "the challenge is then finding room to fit in the new acquisitions." Not much different than we plantaholics bringing home those choice but unplanned discoveries from the nursery, Gwen will discuss how to "shoehorn" in those acquisitions and yet maintain a design.


